The first power tool brand on our list is Makita, not because of its higher price tag but because of its impressive quality. Makita has quickly acquired the reputation of being one of the most trusted brands for power tools.

The brand was founded in 1915 and has been around all those years, but it wasn't until 1958 that it made a major impact in the power tools industry.

With their outstanding planer, they made their way to power drills and then expanded into all the different woodworking tools in use today.

After being founded in 1924, Milwaukee has been owned by multiple companies, but their quality remains durable and dependable. Milwaukee is now owned by Techtronic Industries, a Japanese company that also owns Ryobi.

They were first successful with the Hole Shooter, a one-handed drill that was a big hit. From there, their success grew. Today, they provide construction tools, power tools, outdoor equipment, and much more. Furthermore, they have many cordless tools, resulting in the cordless revolution that has spread to most other brands.

#### Bosch

With its roots dating back to 1886 in Germany, Bosch is one of the oldest brands on the list. Bosch produces excellent tools that place quality in front of quantity, yet it is owned by a charitable organization.

They offer great value, top-of-the-line quality, and reliability, making them incredibly impressive. Bosch is an expensive option, though, so it's primarily for professionals or semi-professionals.

As with other early pioneers of the cordless revolution, Bosch made its mark in early battery technology as well. Their well-built batteries are durable and long-lasting.

# Ridgid

As a brand specifically catering to plumbers and HVAC professionals, Ridgid has become a leading manufacturer of pipe wrenches since its founding in 1923. The red pipe wrench is a top-of-the-line plumbing tool available.

Ridgid is a popular brand among contractors and handymen. Despite its limited power tools, their impact drivers, drills, and sizes are very impressive.

Aside from that, Ridgid offers the best warranty of all brands, with a three-year warranty that comes with additional features not offered by other brands.

### Craftsman

In 1927, Sears founded Craftsman as a company owned by Sears. Stanley Black+Decker became the parent company of Craftsman, making Stanley Black+Decker well-known in the United States.

The acquisition of Craftsman by Stanley Black+Decker in 2017 from Sears was not without incident.

According to the agreement, both companies are permitted to manufacture, market, and sell power tools under the Craftsman's name for a period of 15 years.

There is a wide variety of high-quality corded, gas-powered, and cordless tools and outdoor equipment available from Craftsman today. Craftsman's Weedwhacker brand, which includes string trimmers that are widely used, is its most well-known product line.

Through its Versa System, Craftsman also provides consumers with a good selection of other tools and accessories. Tools such as hammers, pliers, screwdrivers, saws, and more can be stored and organized with the system.

As with other Stanley Black+Decker products, Craftsman marketing targets homeowners and hobbyists. However, many professionals are attracted to the company because of its high quality, durability, and wide product range.

# Ryobi

#### Skil

Its U.S. headquarters remain in Naperville, Illinois, where Skil was founded in 1926.

Although it was very expensive at the time, the first product produced by the company, a worm-drive circular saw, gained immense popularity on construction sites. Despite the fact that the range now includes many different tools, Skil has long been known as "the" saw company based on this saw.

Since 1979, ownership of the company has changed several times, from the Skil Corporation to Emerson Electric to Bosch to Chevron of China in 2016, where the majority of company products are now manufactured.

It is a bit confusing for consumers, but Skil differentiates target markets by using two brand names. The Skil tools are intended for DIYers, while the Skilsaw tools are for professionals. These differences are reflected in specifications and prices.

## Husky

There is a common misunderstanding between "Husky" and Husqvarna, the well-known garden equipment manufacturer. Husky Tools is completely unrelated, born out of Husky Wrench of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, founded in 1924. After various ownerships, Stanley Tool acquired the brand in 1986. In addition to supplying The Home Depot exclusively, the company now owns the brand name rights.

Instead of competing in the crowded power tool market, Home Depot has opted to concentrate on hand tools, compressor-driven pneumatic tools, and a wide selection of cabinets and tool chests. Like Kobalt, Husky Tools offers quality equipment at affordable prices to satisfy the needs of the prosumer market.

#### **IRWIN**

The company was founded in 1885 by Charles Irwin in Martinsville, Ohio when he began making auger bits. In addition to drill bits, the company manufactures saws, chisels, hammers, pliers, wrenches, snippers, screwdrivers, knives, levels, and squares. Today, IRWIN is owned by Stanley Black & Decker.

IRWIN's tools have always been regarded as durable and precise, and they were originally marketed primarily to carpenters and other tradesmen. Although IRWIN's production is primarily carried out in China, the company appears to have retained its reputation despite critics. Despite being expensive, these tools remain a contractor standard and are popular with DIYers who are willing to pay for high-quality tools.

### WEN

WEN is based in Elgin, Illinois, and was founded in 1951. The company primarily focuses on design, research, and development in the U.S., while production happens in the Far East.

WEN offers a wide range of power tools, generators, and garden equipment. The company's power tools are invariably durable and reliable, despite sometimes not using the latest innovations. Independent reviewers often rate WEN as the best tool brand for the money.

### **Festool**

It is no secret that Festool tools are extremely expensive. The German company makes some of the most expensive cordless tools on the market. Festool focuses on construction and carpentry tools, and it promises perfection in the tools it manufactures.

#### Porter-Cable

Porter-Cable is a well-known American power tool manufacturer. Founded in 1906, it has a rich history of innovation, including the introduction of the first portable belt sander and helical-drive circular saw.
